Courses Taught

Baylor University, 2007-present

CSS 5353: <u>Rhetorical Theory</u>

Examines the lines of inquiry that guide rhetorical theorizing and lenses that inform the practice of rhetorical criticism from ancient to contemporary usages.

CSS 5352: <u>Methods of Rhetorical Criticism</u>. Graduate level rhetorical seminar focusing on critical and traditional approaches to discursive analysis.

CSS 5341: Rhetoric and Cultural Studies

Methods of rhetorical criticism influenced and intersected by cultural studies, beginning with early twentieth century and continuing into present day.

CSS 5313: <u>Graduate Seminar: Rhetoric and Society</u>. Graduate level rhetorical seminar focusing on contemporary issues in cultural, ideology, rhetoric and politics.

CSS 5320: <u>Graduate Seminar: Rhetoric and Identity</u>. Graduate level rhetorical seminar focusing on the construction of identity. Topics covered include whiteness, Black Nationalism, social movements, community, citizenship, feminism, queerness, socio-economic class, constitutive rhetoric.

CSS 5318: Seminar in Rhetoric and the Public Sphere

Analysis of major theoretical statements on the changing nature of the public sphere in western democracies and the related implications for the role of argumentation and rhetorical discourse in the formation of public policy. Strong emphasis on social media and modern mediated practices.

CSS 4392: Rhetorics of Race

Media centered exploration of ideas about communication, rhetoric, and race. Emphasis on rhetorical criticism as a methodological approach to public discourse and analysis of race and ethnicity as understood in contemporary American culture.

CSS 4354: African American Communication

Rhetorical strategies of African Americans, focusing on the historically important documents of oratory, argumentation, homiletic, and narrative. Taught with media focus.

CSS 4336: <u>Contemporary Issues in Communication: Rhetorics of Race and Ethnicity</u>. Broad based review of rhetorical issue involving race, ethnicity, the media, and global structures of power.

CSS3302: <u>Introduction to Rhetorical Theory & Criticism</u>. Introductory rhetorical theory and criticism course.

CSS1304-01: <u>Argumentation & Debate</u>. Offers students a broad overview of argumentation and debate as it relates to politics and culture.

CSS3248-01: <u>Advanced Debate.</u> Advanced debate class focusing on argument construction, mainly intended for current members of the Baylor Debate team.

CSS4V85-09: <u>Special Problems in Speech Communication</u>. Independent studies with undergraduates. More than 10 different versions of the class.

CSS5V85-08: <u>Special Problems in Speech Communication</u>. Independent study with graduate students. Nearly 20 different versions of the class.

CSS 5V35-08 <u>Problems in Communication: Rhetoric of Prison Abolition.</u> Independent Study with graduate students analyzing the rhetoric of incarceration, abolition, and the prison industrial complex.

CSS 5V35-08 <u>Problems in Communication: Water, Charity, and NGOs.</u> Independent Study with graduate students analyzing the process of water charities in Africa, how they are rhetorically framed, and the relationship between the United States and Sub-Sahara Africa on water cooperation.

CSS 5V35-10: <u>Special Problems in Speech Communication</u>. Independent study with graduate students. Spring 2012 students researched and wrote about the rhetoric of President Obama and American exceptionalism with a theoretical grounding emphasizing the scholarship of Giorgio Agamben.

CSS3305-03: <u>Advanced Public Speaking</u>. Students are instructed on practices, techniques, and performances related to the art of public speaking. Fall 2007, Summer 2009, Spring 2010, Spring 2011, Summer 2012.

CSS 2264-01: <u>Contest Speaking</u>. Students learn advanced academic debate techniques.Fall 2008, Fall 2009, Spring 2010, Spring 2011, Fall 2011.

CSS 4396-01 (cross-listed as AMS 4397-01): <u>American Rhetoric</u>. Students engage in advanced rhetorical techniques analyzing classic texts of American political and cultural rhetoric, focusing on both public policy and popular culture. Spring 2009.
